What is Restorative Justice?

Restorative Justice focuses on healing and restoring the brokenness of victim, of offender, and of community.

In our work we are present to two realities.

first — love, more than any other virtue, is the motive and agent for growth in people’s lives, and

second — the single most absent reality in the criminal justice system is love.

In response to a justice system that has punishment and retribution as its aims, our work seeks instead to restore community.

Restorative Justice is what lies behind all of our programs. Depending on the situation, we may work separately or in partnership with the retributive justice system.

What We Do

Through education and action we help those who have been impacted by crime. We:

- **visit** people who are in prison.
- **assist** people who have been released from prison.
- **support** victims of violent crime.
- **teach** others about restorative justice.
- **make connections** between faith communities and people leaving prison.

Our Programs

P2P (Person to Person)

Volunteers visit prisoners at the Regional Psychiatric Centre (RPC) in Saskatoon. Some of these visits have resulted in long lasting friendships.

CoSA (Circles of Support and Accountability)

Volunteers meet regularly with formerly incarcerated men who have offended sexually. The goal: to help them lead healthy and law-abiding lives.

Forward Step

Volunteers facilitate a course on Restorative Justice for inmates at the Saskatoon Correctional Centre. Objectives include increasing sensitivity to indigenous people, shared learning and empowerment.

Community Chaplaincy

We find support within faith communities for persons who have been incarcerated and are seeking to reintegrate back into society.
